Highlights

Africans Rising Wins 2024 African Advancement Award for Social Justice and Advocacy

Africans Rising won the 2024 African Advancement Award for Social Justice and Advocacy, recognizing its efforts in promoting solidarity, unity, and dignity in Africa. The award was received by Movement Coordinator Hardi Yakubu and board member Jonas Ndubuisi Promise at the African Heritage Awards in Lagos, Nigeria. In his acceptance speech, Hardi emphasized the need for African unity, better governance, and economic development. He also advocated for removing border restrictions to facilitate trade, job creation, and solidarity among Africans.



The awards honored individuals who have made significant contributions to humanity, with other notable winners including former President of Ghana John Mahama and Dr. Jane Onwumere. The ceremony was chaired by former President of Botswana, Seretse Ian Khama, who criticized power-hungry leaders driving Africa backwards. The award affirms Africans Rising's vision in promoting African unity and advancing the continent's image.

01. Campaigns and Advocacy

Over the past years Africans Rising has built its capacity for campaigns and advocacy through bringing together movements, civil society organisations and other actors to push for different issues affecting Africans.





The Borderless Africa Campaign emerged from the All-African Movements Assembly (AAMA) in Arusha, Tanzania in August 2022.

The campaign seeks to:

- ❖ *Abolish intra-African visa requirements*
- ❖ *Ratify and implement the AU protocol on free movement*
- ❖ *Introduce a common African passport*
- ❖ *Foster trade and global African connectivity*

First Borderless Africa Convening in Lusaka Zambia

Borderless Africa Convening

The Borderless Africa Convening in Lusaka, Zambia which took place in May 23rd to 25th brought together several campaigners and stakeholders from the continent and beyond in the quest to push for abolishment of colonial-era borders that have long divided the African people.





The push was a continuation of last year's mobilization which saw Africans across the world join in collective action and embraced the spirit of Pan-Africanism as we commemorated 61 years of African unity during this year's African Liberation Week. Furthermore, since Africa opened its market to intra-trade under the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), this year we continued to push the vision of an Africa where Africans can move around their own continent without the current restrictions in place, for better trade, job creation, solidarity and economic development. A formal launch and press conference was held in Zambia, utilizing a hybrid format to accommodate both in-person and virtual attendees.




First-Ever Borderless Africa School Club Launched in Ghana

History was made on November 12, 2024, as the first-ever Borderless Africa Student Club debuted at the University of Media, Arts and Communications in Ghana. This pioneering initiative, inspired by Africans Rising's Borderless Africa Campaign, aims to promote African unity, free movement, and integration. The event was witnessed by two Africans Rising's staff, the movement coordinator, Hardi Yakubu and the Engagement and Collaboration Officer, Prince Akpah.

The objective of the club as emphasised by the club President Miss. Clarissa Bandoh, is that *"Borderless Africa is about rediscovering our African identity and building a future without barriers. Our strength lies in unity."*

Economic Justice

As part of our Economic Justice Campaign, we hosted a virtual townhall titled “Achieving Economic Justice for All Africans: A Path Towards Sustainable Development” on July 10, 2024. The event brought together activists, policymakers, researchers, and entrepreneurs from across the continent to explore the root causes of economic injustice, promote gender equality and

women’s economic empowerment, and identify practical strategies for advancing fairer economic systems in Africa. Through panel discussions and audience engagement, the townhall created a platform for knowledge sharing, collective action, and strengthened our advocacy for inclusive, accountable, and sustainable economic development.



Climate Justice

As part of our joint advocacy on Climate Justice, we played a key role in the co-creation and planning of the 2024 Climate Justice Camp held in Tanzania, organised in collaboration with Roots and a coalition of global and regional partners. Building on the legacy of previous camps in Tunisia (2022) and Lebanon (2023), the 2024 edition marked the third and largest gathering of its kind in the Global South. Designed by

organizers and for organizers, the camp brought together hundreds of young climate and social justice advocates from across Africa and beyond for a week of relationship building, capacity development, and strategic collaboration. Our participation helped strengthen movement-building efforts, elevate African perspectives, and foster deeper continental solidarity in the fight for climate justice.



World Environment Day

On World Environment Day, our members in Cameroon joined Greenpeace Africa and other partners in a peaceful March to commemorate the day. The March was not only a moment to raise awareness about protecting our environment and confronting the climate crisis, but also an opportunity to emphasize our call for a Borderless Africa. We highlighted that climate challenges know no borders, and true solutions require unity, solidarity, and cross-border collaboration across the continent.

African Liberation Week Mass Mobilisation

African Liberation Week Activities

The African Liberation Week Mass Mobilisation is set aside to mobilise all Africans - grassroots organisations, trade unions, community groups, women's organisations, faith groups, youth groups, local associations, media, and individuals to take action on specific themes or issues relevant to the local as well as continental contexts. These may include but are not limited to, actions seeking accountability from governments, challenging the status quo, showing solidarity, community meetings, film showings, protests, webinars and public education campaigns.

The 2024 African Liberation Week was celebrated under the theme "*A Borderless Africa for All Africans*". This year's mobilization was a continuation of last year's mobilization and has been used to continue to push the vision of an Africa where Africans can move around their continent without the current restrictions in place, for better trade, integration and development. The Sub-themes for the 2024 ALW were:

- ❖ Pan-African Solidarity with African Countries Affected by Conflicts
- ❖ Climate and Environmental Justice, Gender Justice,
- ❖ Economic Justice



Number and distribution of activities

- ❖ 517 applications received ,
- ❖ 271 submitted by individuals,
- ❖ 242 by organizations.

Key Objectives of the 2024 Africa Liberation Week:

- 1. Advocate for the ratification** and enforcement of the AU protocol on the free movement of people in Africa.
- 2. Provide a platform** for key stakeholders to meet, share experiences, and exchange on the benefits of abolishing borders and visas for Africans in Africa and the diaspora.
- 3. Raise awareness** of the different conflicts in Africa and rally pan-African solidarity in ending these conflicts.
- 4. Call for** Climate and Environmental Justice, Gender Justice, and Economic Justice in Africa.



The activities for the 2024 African Liberation Week ran from 20th to the 26th of May, all over the African continent and the diaspora. Key among the actions organised were peaceful marches, community dialogue, webinars, workshops etc were undertaken by members from different African countries.

Organized to address the sub-themes of Pan-African Solidarity with African Countries Affected by Conflicts and Climate and Environmental Justice, Gender Justice, and Economic Justice.

Marches



Kenya

In Nairobi, Kenya, members of Africans Rising and other organizations like Kongamano La Mapinduzi, Activista, Kayole Community Justice Center and many others submitted a petition to the Kenyan government, calling for the ratification of the Protocol to the

Treaty Establishing the African Economic Community. The treaty aims to ensure free movement of persons, right of residence, and right of establishment across Africa. The petition comes as Kenya begins implementing the first phase of the treaty, which includes abolishing visa requirements for African travelers. The introduction of an Electronic Travel Authorization (ETA) system, that mandates travelers to apply 72 hours before visiting and demands a processing fee, contradicts the spirit of the treaty by imposing additional barriers.



Nigeria

In Abuja, Nigeria members of Africans Rising and other organizations like Youth Ambassadors for Democracy, Ajike Media Hub and others went to the streets to demand that their government removes visas for all Africans and that it adopts a Borderless Africa.



Zambia

Africans Rising members took to the streets on 25th May to push for the removal of colonial borders and call on the Zambian government to ratify the Protocol to the Treaty Establishing the African Economic Community. They also called on the African governments to adopt the

borderless Africa campaign as a key contributor to the development and to ratify the African Union's free movement protocol.





Solidarity **Missions**

In 2024, Africans Rising led a Solidarity Mission to Kakuma Refugee Camp in Kenya through *the Pan-African Solidarity for Sudan* initiative, in response to the devastating humanitarian crisis caused by the conflict in Sudan. Working in partnership with Girl Power Action Initiative, a women-led grassroots organisation based in Kakuma 4, we coordinated the distribution of vital supplies to over 50 Sudanese refugee families. The donations mobilised from across the continent included over 300kg of rice, 240 bags of wheat flour, 200 bags of maize flour, 80 litres of cooking oil, 80kg of washing powder, more than 10,000 clothing and shoe items, and over 500 sanitary packs. Despite logistical hurdles, high storage costs, and unpredictable weather, the mission was a powerful demonstration of Pan-African unity, grassroots leadership, and the unwavering spirit of solidarity. It also underscored the urgent need to build stronger response mechanisms and maintain deep community networks to ensure Africans can continue standing together in times of crisis solidarity in Kenya and solidarity in Nigeria.

Solidarity Mission in Nigeria



Another solidarity mission was sent to Kaduna State in Nigeria. This followed a bombing in Tudun-Biri, resulting in 84 deaths with 66 persons injured. The attack occurred in two phases, within a short interval between bombs, leaving the community devastated. Victims, including men who were primary breadwinners, expressed gratitude for relief from the

government and Africans Rising but emphasized the ongoing need for support. The Africans Rising solidarity mission, led by Abubakar Saidu Midala, handed financial aid, skill development, and livelihood support to the victims. This solidarity missions emphasises Africans Rising's push for pan- African mobilisation and support.

Solidarity Mission in Kenya



As part of our commitment to solidarity in times of crisis, Africans Rising undertook a solidarity mission in response to the devastating floods in Kenya, which displaced many families and destroyed livelihoods. We worked closely with the Utalii Justice Center to provide timely support that addressed urgent needs such as food, shelter, and other essentials. This mission reaffirmed our belief in the power of collective action.

Movement Building and Support

Africans Rising movement building program is in two folds namely: building the Africans Rising movement into a more formidable one and supporting the building of grassroots movements. The two have a correlation.





In 2024, as part of these efforts, Africans Rising partnered with Mboa Hub (a Greenpeace Africa project) to train youth activists working in climate justice on movement building and organising. This training not only equipped young people with practical tools and strategies

for effective advocacy but also led to the successful formation of the Cameroon Climate Youth Movement, YONECA. This milestone reflects our commitment to cultivating sustainable, youth-led movements that champion justice, equity, and transformative change across Africa.

Pre-AAMA Consultations

2024 All-African Movement Assembly

In preparation for the All African Movement Assembly (AAMA), Africans Rising organised Pre-AAMA Consultations across all regions; West, Central, East, Southern, and North Africa—as well as with the Diaspora. These regional consultations provided a vital platform for members to engage, exchange ideas, and strengthen connections within their communities. Importantly, the consultations enabled Africans Rising to gather critical insights and priorities from diverse voices, ensuring that the AAMA agenda is responsive to the varied needs and perspectives of activists across the continent and beyond.

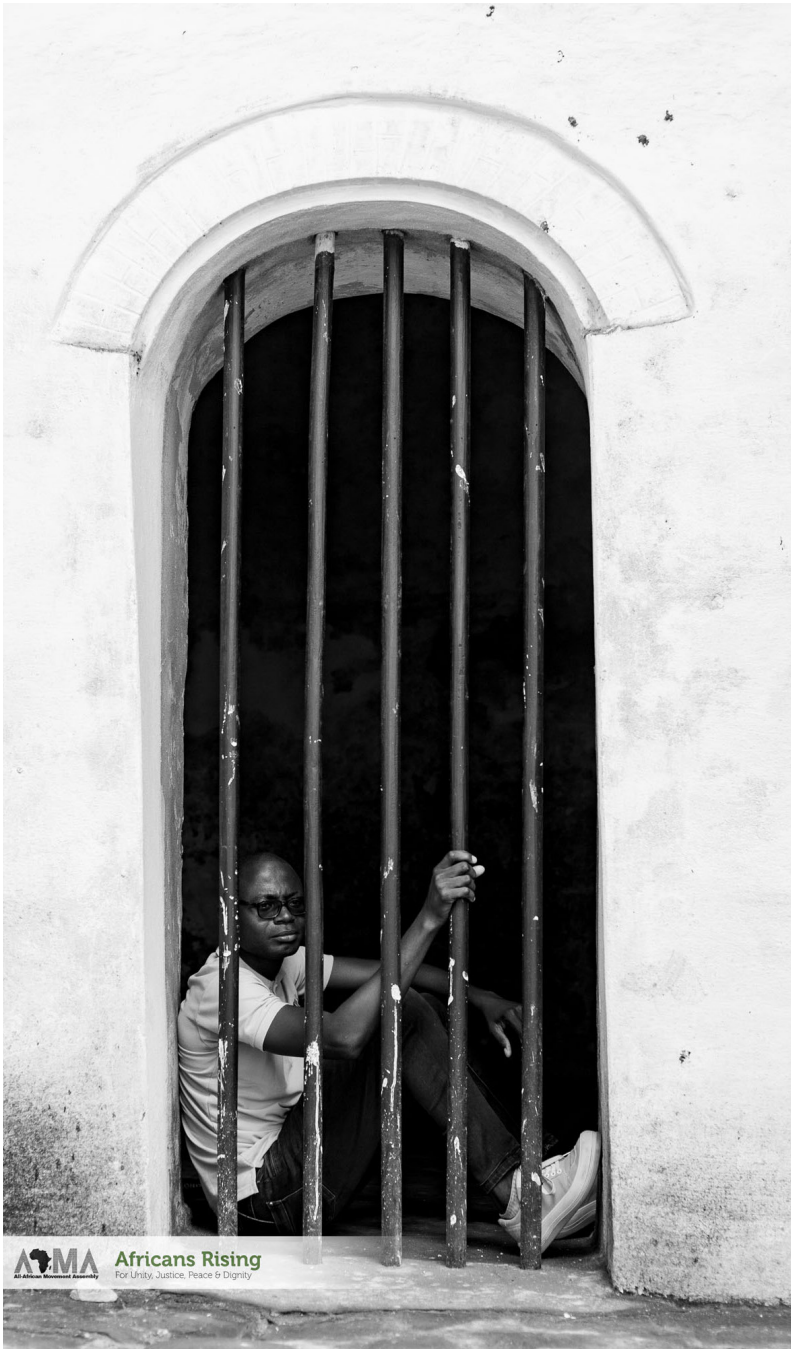


The Assembly

Held from August 29th to 31st, the Assembly brought together over 300 physical participants, and more than 100 virtual attendees, all united in their commitment to advancing Africa's development. A key theme that emerged from the Assembly was the push for a borderless Africa, where all citizens can travel freely between countries without needing visas. According to the delegates, this would not only enhance the movement of people and goods but also strengthen intra-African trade, foster economic prosperity, and build fraternity among Africans. The largest gathering of African movements, activists, and human rights defenders, concluded its three-day event in Accra, Ghana, with a resounding call for Pan-African solidarity, free movement across the continent, and more robust human rights advocacy.

AfM Africans Rising
For Unity, Justice, Peace & Dignity

The All-Africans Movement Assembly (AAMA) began with a historic visit to the Cape Coast and Elmina Castles in Ghana, where participants revisited the dark history of slavery and human trafficking. The tour highlighted the exploitation of African natural resources and manpower, with participants learning about the brutal treatment of slaves and the role of European colonizers. Key aspects of the visit included:

- ❖ **Cape Coast Castle:** A 358-year-old castle that served as a hub for human trafficking, with participants touring the “Condemnation Room/Cell”, “Palaver Hall/Slave Market”, “Male Slave Dungeon”, and the “Door of No Return”.
- ❖ **Elmina Castle :** A castle with 30 ports along the coast of West and sub-Saharan Africa, showcasing the extensive network of human trafficking.





The visit was followed by an Intergenerational Lunch Dialogue, where participants discussed the role of religion in slavery and human trafficking. Key takeaways from the dialogue included:

- **Collaboration with religious leaders:** The need for Africans Rising to work with religious leaders to promote African unity and challenge exploitation.
- **Learning from the past:** The importance of learning from history to inform present-day activism and ensure that past mistakes are not repeated.
- **Funding and sustainability:** The need for Africans Rising to raise funds independently and avoid reliance on external funding sources.

The dialogue concluded with several recommendations, including:

- Inclusion of women by putting them at the center of discussions and decision-making processes.
- The importance of engaging with local communities and promoting grassroots activism through community outreach
- Africans should promote their cultural heritage and dress in a way that reflects their identity.
- The need to build intergenerational connections and promote knowledge sharing between older and younger activists through bridging generational gaps
- Inclusion of marginalized communities by integrating LGBTQ+ and other marginalized communities into the movement.



AAMA 2024

marked a significant milestone in the Pan-African movement, emphasizing unity, solidarity, and collective action towards a prosperous Africa.

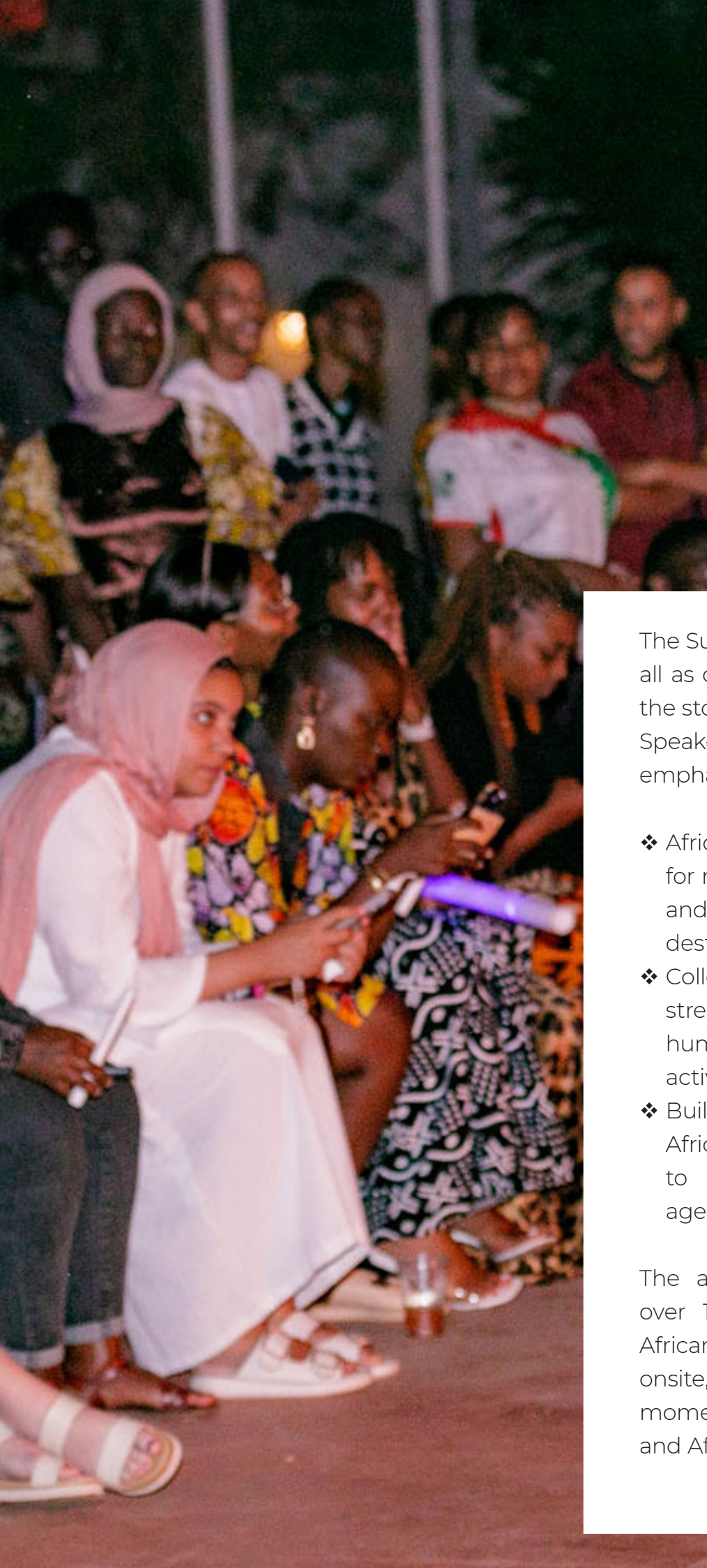
The assembly highlighted a renewed call for African Unity with Emma Nyerere and Samia Nkrumah, daughters of Julius Nyerere and Kwame Nkrumah, respectively, delivered stirring speeches advocating for a united Africa to tackle challenges like poverty, inequality, and neocolonialism. The assembly also highlighted the importance of Pan-African Solidarity, solidarity between Africans and the African diaspora, recognizing the diaspora's role as the sixth region of Africa in advancing the

Pan-African agenda globally. Challenges Facing Africa was discussed focusing on economic independence, cultural identity, and the role of the diaspora in Africa's development, amidst shrinking civic spaces, police and military crackdowns, and human rights abuses. The assembly included training sessions on "Advocacy and Campaigning" and "Future-dreaming Rituals" to equip participants with skills for effective activism.



Pan-African Solidarity Vigil: Fallen but Not Forgotten

In line with the Africans Rising solidarity program, a Pan-African Solidarity Vigil to remember fallen activists was organised to pay homage to activists and Africans who have died in liberation struggles. Milouda Bouchi who was an Africans Rising Coordinating Collective Board member was one of those remembered. This was done around a huge fire with participants holding lit candles as they sang solemn liberation songs. During the vigil, participants were equally edified on the crisis going on in some African countries like Cameroon, DR Congo, Kenya and Sudan. From Cameroon, one of our members narrated a touching anecdote of how he and his family have been impacted by the ongoing Anglophone crisis. From Kenya comrades were edified on lack of ethical governance that led to the killings of many youths in the country.



The Sudan war was the height of it all as comrades shed tears when the story of the war was narrated. Speakers at the assembly emphasized the need for:

- ❖ African Unity as being crucial for realizing Africa's full potential and reclaiming its strength and destiny.
- ❖ Collective Action by Leveraging strength in numbers to defend human rights and promote activism.
- ❖ Building solidarity between Africans and the diaspora to advance the Pan-African agenda.

The assembly brought together over 1,500 participants from 55 African countries, both online and onsite, underscoring the growing momentum for Pan-Africanism and African unity.

Individual Giving

At Africans Rising, our Individual Giving (IG) campaign called the “One Afro for a Million” took many forms or approaches where members and allies were encouraged to donate at least \$1 equivalent in their local currency to support Africans Rising. These Individual Giving approaches were aimed at encouraging Pan-Africans on the continent and abroad to support the vision of the movement to expand its work through financial and non-financial support. Africans Rising has coordinated individual giving through engagements with philanthropists, high networth persons, corporate giving, and crises giving among others. For example,

we have successfully raised funds and attracted in-kind support during the campaign on Cyclone Freddy for displaced victims in Malawi and on civil war victims in Sudan. In 2023, we raised an estimated amount of about \$4,500 in cash and in-kind donations were valued at \$2,000. Acknowledging that IG deployment is at its nascent stages, Africans Rising has started exploring the use of Bitcoin (BTC) as alternative resource mobilisation mechanism. Bitcoin is a cryptocurrency designed to act as money or a form of payment outside the control of any person, group and entity, and thus removing the involvement of third-party in financial transactions.

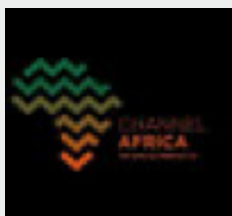
